DIRECTIONS FROM PHILADELPHIA

Take the Schuylkill Expressway (I-76) West. Follow I-76 West to Route 202 South. Take Rt. 202 South to the Great Valley/Route 29 North Exit. At the end of the ramp, proceed through the light onto Liberty Blvd. The Hotel will be on your right.

DIRECTIONS FROM PHILADELPHIA AIRPORT

Take I-95 South to Route 476 North. Follow 476 North to the Schuylkill Expressway (I-76) West to Route 202 South. Take Route 202 South to the Great Valley/Route 29 North exit. At the end of the ramp, proceed through the light onto Liberty Blvd. The Hotel will be on your right.

DIRECTIONS FROM SOUTH JERSEY

Take I-95 South to Route 322 West. Take 322 West to US Route 1 South to Route 202 North. Take 202 North to the Great Valley/Route 29 North Exit. Turn Right onto Route 29 North. Turn Right at 2nd light onto Liberty Blvd. Hotel is on the left.

DIRECTIONS FROM WILMINGTON AND POINTS SOUTH

(MARYLAND, DELAWARE, WASHINGTON D.C., WEST CHESTER, PA) Take I-95 North to Route 202 North. Follow Rt. 202 North to the Great Valley/Rt. 29 North Exit. Turn right onto Rt. 29 North. Turn right at 2nd light onto Liberty Blvd. Hotel will be on the left.

In 1906, Pierre S. du Pont purchased the Peirce Arboretum to save its trees from being cut for lumber. Over the next nearly half century, Mr. du Pont developed Longwood Gardens into what it is today, a magnificent horticultural showplace. We invite you to visit Longwood Gardens, which now encompasses 1,050 acres of gardens, woodlands, and meadows. Enjoy over 11,000 types of plants, more fountains than any other garden in the US, educational and visitor programming, and over 400 performances a year.

Winterthur Museum www.winterthur.org

Winterthur, an American country estate, is the former home of Henry Francis du Pont (1880-1969), an avid antiques collector and horticulturist. In the early 20th century, H. F. du Pont and his father, Henry Algernon du Pont, designed Winterthur in the spirit of 18th and 19th-century European country houses. A visit to Winterthur will immerse you in another time and place. Rediscover America's heritage through its unparalleled collections of antiques and Americana. Wander the breathtaking beauty of the 60-acre naturalistic Winterthur Garden.

American Helicopter Museum www.helicoptermuseum.org

The American Helicopter Museum and Education Center is the nation's premier aviation museum devoted exclusively to helicopters. We collect, restore and display historic aircraft and chronicle the origin and development of rotary wing aircraft. Currently, the Museum displays over 35 civilian and military helicopters, autogiros and convertaplanes. The exhibits span the history of rotary wing aircraft from the earliest helicopters to the latest addition to our nation's defense, the V-22 Osprey.

Constructed between 1732 and 1756 as the State House of the Province of Pennsylvania, it is considered a fine example of Georgian architecture. From 1775 to 1783 (except for the winter of 1777 - 1778 when Philadelphia was occupied by the British Army) this was the meeting place for the Second Continental Congress. It was in the Assembly Room of this building that George Washington was appointed commander in chief of the Continental Army in 1775 and the Declaration of Independence was adopted on July 4, 1776.

The National Constitution Center in historic Philadelphia is America's most interactive history museum. Located just two blocks from the Liberty Bell and Independence Hall, it is the only museum devoted to the U.S. Constitution and the story of *We, the people*.

The Brandywine Battlefield Historic Site brings to life the largest engagement of the Revolutionary War, fought on September 11, 1777, between the Continental Army led by General George Washington and the British forces headed by General William Howe.
